## Why elections?

On November 6 and 7, 2021, citizens will vote for:

- the mayor of Montréal;
- a borough mayor;
- a city councillor;
- a borough councillor.

Elected individuals will work for Montréal until 2025.

Your vote is important.



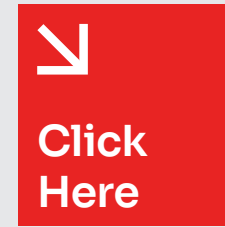
## When to vote?

You have 4 days to vote:

- on **Saturday, October 30**  
from 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- on **Sunday, October 31**  
from 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- on **Saturday, November 6**  
from 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- on **Sunday, November 7**  
from 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m.



## Where to vote?

In October 2021, you'll receive  
a **reminder card** by mail.

The reminder card will indicate the address  
where you must go to vote.

All polling stations are universally accessible.



## Who can vote?

To have the right to vote, you must be registered on the electoral list.

On voting day, you must be aged 18 years or over.

You must have held Canadian citizenship since September 1, 2021.

On September 1, 2021, you must:

- have lived in Québec for 6 months or more and have an address in Montréal;

or

- have been the owner of a property in Montréal for at least 1 year.

Individuals who are under curatorship cannot vote.

**Check your registration on the electoral list.**

To vote, you must be registered on the electoral list.

To check whether you are registered on the electoral list, you can call **514-872-8683**.



You can also click here to check your registration on the electoral list.

If your name is on the electoral list, you will receive a **notice of entry** by mail at the beginning of October.

Read your notice of entry carefully.

Is your name properly spelled on the notice of entry?

Do you see any errors on the notice of entry?

## If you are not registered, if your name does not appear on the notice of entry, or if you see an error on the notice of entry

You must go to a board of revisors to register or to have the error corrected.

You will receive a list of addresses for boards of revisors by mail.

You can go to any board of revisors on the list.

You can go to the board of revisors at the following times:

- **Tuesday, October 12**  
from noon to 7 p.m.
- **Wednesday, October 13**  
from noon to 7 p.m.
- **Thursday, October 14**  
from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.
- **Friday, October 15**  
from noon to 7 p.m.
- **Saturday, October 16**  
from noon to 6 p.m.
- **Sunday, October 17**  
from noon to 6 p.m.
- **Monday, October 18**  
from noon to 7 p.m.

After October 18, 2021, you will no longer be able to register to vote.

Someone can go to the board of revisors on your behalf.

The following individuals can help you:

- your spouse;
- a relative;
- a person who lives with you.

You don't have to go to the board of revisors with this person.

You, or the person making the request, must bring 2 documents to identify you:

- 1 document with your name and date of birth;
- 1 document with your name and address.

## How to register if you need to self-isolate because of COVID-19 or if you are unable to travel for health reasons?

If you need to self-isolate or if you are unable to travel for health reasons, you may register by mail.

You can write to the board of revisors **before October 18, 2021.**

## How to vote if you need to self-isolate because of COVID-19 or if you are unable to travel for health reasons?

If you need to self-isolate, you can vote by mail.

If you are unable to travel for health reasons, you can also vote by mail.

Friends or family who help you and who live with you can also vote by mail.

To vote by mail, you must make a request **no later than October 27, 2021.**

There are two ways to make a request:

The kit contains:

- voting instructions;
- your ballots with the candidates' names;
- a postage-paid envelope addressed to Élections Montréal.

## How to vote if you live in a seniors' residence, a residential care facility or a shelter?

You can vote by mail.

You can also vote in person at the polling station indicated on your reminder card.

To vote by mail, you must make a request **no later than October 27, 2021.**

## Voting days

To vote, you must go to the address indicated on your **reminder card**.

At the polling station, you must wear a mask.

You must bring a blue or black ink pen or a lead pencil.

You must also bring one of the following pieces of ID:

- Health insurance card;
- Driver's licence;
- Canadian passport;
- Certificate of Indian Status;
- Canadian Armed Forces card

On election day, Élections Montréal will put measures in place to make voting easier and safer for everyone.

## In-person voting

Elections employees will give you one or several papers.

Each paper is a **voting ballot**.

On the ballot, make a mark in the circle beside the name of the candidate you have chosen.

You can only choose one candidate on each ballot.

It doesn't matter if your mark on the ballot is slightly outside the circle.

But the mark must not touch another circle.



## After the elections

The election results will be announced on November 7 after 8 p.m.

The results will be posted on the website **elections.montreal.ca**

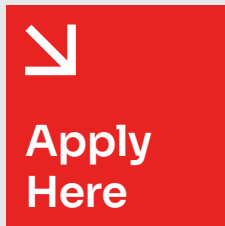
## If you want to work for the elections on voting days
